Invasive Species Presentations: Rubric Building Exercise

Oral communication is considered a core aspect of **employability**, and involves informing, persuading, creating understanding, and/or building consensus.¹

Oral communication is typically evaluated on **content** and **expression**. Content refers to the ideas presented, their development and their organization. Expression comprises both style and delivery, style referring to the use of language and linguistic devices and delivery to the use of voice and body in communicating the content. One final factor cuts across both content and expression: **audience adaptation**, which has to do with the <u>appropriateness and effectiveness</u> of the message for its intended audience. Appropriateness is generally thought of as the degree to which a message suits the immediate setting and circumstances as well as the listeners' demographics, beliefs, values, and existing knowledge of the topic.²
